WELCOME ADDRESS OF FEDERICO CIATTAGLIA CONSUL GENERAL OF ITALY IN HOUSTON

It is a pleasure to welcome you to the 51[^] Annual American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages ACTFL Convention, which this year takes place in New Orleans, Louisiana, with a considerable number of Italian participants.

The Convention is the greatest nationwide gathering in the field of language teaching.

ACTFL is the most important American organization dedicated to the promotion and development of the teaching of foreign languages at all educational levels, in both United States and Canada. Therefore its activity is of extreme interest for the Institutions responsible for the promotion of the Italian Language and especially for our Teachers, who operate at different levels of educational institutions, for the Chairpersons of the Departments of Italian language and culture of the American Universities, as well as for the Directors of the non-profit Organizations - the so called "Enti Gestor?" - organizing courses of Italian Culture and Language on behalf of our Government.

The magnitude of this annual event, encompassing all the foreign languages taught in the Unites States, is further confirmed by the presence of eminent speakers from many different Countries. In addition to being an important platform for promoting foreign languages and cultures, the convention is also a unique opportunity for field experts and teachers to share experiences.

As is known the study of Italian has grown increasingly in the United States in the last few years and Italian is currently the fourth most studied foreign language in the US. Likewise, increasing interest is being given to the history, culture and lifestyle of our Country. The excellent results achieved so far, however, should not be considered a point of arrival (even if important), but a starting point to achieve even more ambitious goals.

Thanks to the strong impulse in this direction of our Embassy in Washington, to the initiatives of "Enti Gestori", the University Departments of Italian, as well as the qualified Teachers of the Schools where Italian is taught, the prospects of a further strong affirmation in the USA of our language and of our culture can be concretely realized.

I extend my best wishes for great success of the Convention.

Dear Teachers, Dear AATI members, Dear Administrators,

I wish to thank you wholeheartedly for your passionate contribution to the teaching of Italian language in the USA, which is a priority of our cultural policy.

ACTFL's activity is extremely important for our Institutions charged with the promotion of Italian Language, for the Teachers of Italian at all educational levels, for the Chairpersons of the Departments of Italian, for the Directors of the non-profit Organizations organizing language courses for which the Government allocates funds.

Of the major modern languages taught in U.S. universities, Italian is in fourth place. Also on the rise is the number of students in primary and secondary schools who are studying Italian. A high number of students took the Italian AP exam this year (from 2571 Italian AP exams in 2017 to 2926 Italian AP exams in 2018 – *statistics from College Board*), which proves the great interest in the study.

The Italian Consular network plans to continue to promote the language, as the Italian government feels the study of Italian in America is important.

Italy is also the second most popular destination for U.S. students in study abroad programs (following Great Britain), in numbers reaching nearly 34,000 in 2017 (*statistics from the Institute of International Education*) who chose to spend part of their study periods in Italy, either on study abroad programs or enrolled in language courses, or in full undergraduate programs with tuition mainly in English. I'd like to underline Italy is the top non-English speaking destination for American students.

Let's consider the future is multilingual and bilingual: learning a language not only helps to develop and understand other cultures and people, but also to improve cognitive function; therefore, the benefits are multidimensional.

The role of all teachers and administrators, and parents is extremely important to promote the Italian language and culture in the US. Thank you for helping us maintain this appreciated and sophisticated legacy alive.
